

he women and men who gathered at the J. Huston Tavern on June 14, 1959, to form a new organization, had an ambitious goal: to preserve the irreplaceable historic structures of Arrow Rock. Thanks to those visionaries, the Friends of Arrow Rock has spent the last 65 years preserving and maintaining an impressive collection of 19th-century buildings.

It is maintenance that determines the long-term success of a preservation project, because after the stabilization, repair, and beautification is complete, maintenance must begin. Without it, all that work and investment in a building's preservation is wasted. That's why Friends of Arrow

Rock is deeply committed to the ongoing care of its properties. Thanks to the hard work of our development committee members and the generosity of our donors, we have been able to complete several significant maintenance projects and are about to begin others. FAR's historic preservation consultant Marty Selby, at the request of FAR's properties committee, developed the scope of work for all these projects and is supervising the contractors to make sure they uphold FAR's high standards of preservation.

Last year, supported by a grant from the Buckner Foundation, we made repairs to the exterior of Brown Lodge No. 22 of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, which houses the Arrow Rock Black History Museum. The exterior is a frequent target of woodpeckers that carve holes into the wood siding and trim. Squirrels often follow behind, enlarging the holes to gain access into the walls and attic of the building. Contractors patched the holes and painted the entire exterior of this building, which holds such a significant place in the town's history.

Thanks to a grant awarded by the Sunderland Foundation, work is underway on several other FAR buildings. At the 1868 Odd Fellows Lodge Hall, which houses the Missouri Press Association's Print Shop Museum on the ground floor, cracks in the plaster ceiling in that museum space were repaired. The shutters on the second

story windows were restored and anchored in place, and the failing gutters are scheduled to be replaced.

Other Sunderland-funded projects set to begin soon are repairs to the post office roof; repair of pest damage and exterior repainting at the Miller-Bradford House along with restoration of the detached garage; gutter replacement, pest damage repair, and exterior painting at the Christian Church; downspout replacement and brick repointing on the rear of the Friends of Arrow Rock headquarters on the boardwalk; downspout replacement and investigation of the rising damp issue that is damaging a small area of the exterior brick and interior plaster at the rear of the Masonic Lodge Hall;



exterior painting of the trim and porch of the Sites House; cleaning and applying a preservative stain to the exterior, repairing and reputtying windows, and installing basic electrical service to the Shelby Log Cabin.

The Lawless Farmstead is a turn-of-the-20th-century property that, through an agreement with FAR and Missouri State Parks, serves as program space for the Missouri River Bird Observatory. It is set to undergo major repairs thanks to money allocated by the State of Missouri. The project, which is currently in development by Missouri State Parks and FAR's properties committee, will include repair and a fresh coat of paint for the house's exterior, installation of a new HVAC



system, filling in of two cisterns, repointing of the stone foundation, installation of a new roof and gutters, siding repair on the smokehouse, stabilization of the barn, and other projects to make the property safe and attractive for visitors.

In Arrow Rock, we know spring has arrived when we hear the cheerful sound of schoolchildren arriving in town for a morning of hands-on history lessons. Friends of Arrow Rock began its education programs in 1984, and we've been welcoming youngsters here ever since to get a real sense of what life was like for children in the 1800s.

This year's programs, which run from April 11 through May 26, include the popular "Family Life and School Days in the 1800s" program for students in grades 1-4, and "Natural and Cultural History of Arrow Rock" for grades 3-6.

The programs, which are led by trained, experienced interpreters, are a fun way to learn Missouri history. And these programs are so memorable that it's not unusual for adults to stop by the Friends of Arrow Rock office and share their childhood memories of a long-ago school trip to Arrow Rock where they wrote with a quill pen and learned how 19th-century children washed clothes using a washboard and tub.

FAR, in cooperation with the Arrow Rock State Historic Site (ARSHS), manages and staffs the programs. Missouri River Bird Observatory educators lend a hand with the natural history program.

Although most participants come from area schools, there is a day set aside for home-schooled students on May 1. Interested educators should call 660-837-3300. Reservations are required and there is a small participation fee for each student.

# CHILDREN'S CRAFT FESTIVAL

FAR and ARSHS also collaborate for the biennial Children's Craft Festival. That's a one-day event held every other fall that brings hundreds of children to town for a one-of-a-kind history festival. Last year's Children's Craft Festival enjoyed some of the best weather that festival has ever seen, and the kids (and the adults who came with them) had a wonderful time. According to Betty Vollmer, historian and resource interpreter at the ARSHS, the 2023 event brought in about 830 elementary-age children, plus hundreds of teachers and parents who came with them. The activities of the day, which included craft demonstrations, tours, and old-fashioned games, were supported by 35 volunteers from in and around Arrow Rock. This year is an off year for the festival, but plans are already underway for the 2025 event.
