Te knew 2019 was going to be a big year for the Friends of Arrow Rock. After all, it's our 60th anniversary year! But until a few months ago we had no idea just how momentous 2019 would be. It all started last June with a public meeting hosted by Missouri State Parks. State Parks Director Ben Ellis explained that, while the state





government understood the importance of the J. Huston Tavern to Arrow Rock and to Missouri, it would be difficult for his division to continue running that restaurant. It was clear that if the Tavern was going to continue its tradition as the oldest continuously operating restaurant west of the Mississippi, someone was going to need to step up and take it on.

That's exactly what the board of trustees of the Friends of Arrow Rock did. After months of careful analysis, planning and negotiations, our board forged a cooperative agreement with Missouri State Parks. Beginning Jan. 1,

2019, Friends of Arrow Rock will manage the operation of the J Huston Tavern restaurant, while Missouri State Parks continues to maintain the building. New General Manager Karen Avery Miller and Kitchen Manager Janet Carmack will have the Tavern ready to open by March 1.






A magnanimous Friends of Arrow Rock board member has offered to match up to \$6,000 in donations designated for a new tour tram, as long as those donations come in by December 31. Her gift, combined with \$6,000 in matching gifts, would get us to our \$30,000 goal and have a new, 12-passenger tram in service for the 2019 tour season. The new tram is enclosed, so we won't have to fret about rainy days. It includes a heating system, fans for cooling, and an onboard PA system that will allow our tour guides to share information even while they're driving.

istory unfolded within its walls. George Caleb Bingham immortalized it in his paintings. Political careers began over rounds of beer; romances began in the ballroom. It has been the heartbeat of Arrow Rock since 1834. But here in 2018, the J. Huston Tavern needed help from some Friends. Missouri State Parks owns the building and has been running its restaurant for the past five years. It hasn't been easy; governments aren't set up to run restaurants. In the case of the Tavern, it wasn't the building, but rather the business that needed preservation, and the Friends of Arrow Rock board wasn't about to let the oldest continuously operating restaurant west of the Mississippi cease to operate if there was something they could to do to keep it going. The organization has entered into a cooperative agreement with Missouri State Parks to operate the tavern, starting in 2019.

"Our organization is deeply committed to the preservation of Arrow Rock's historic treasures and certainly the Huston Tavern is no exception," says Chet Breitwieser, vice president of Friends of Arrow Rock. "Members of our board of trustees were united in their strong desire to keep the Huston Tavern operating in addition to expanding hours, offerings and hospitality."

Mr. Huston's House

Joseph Huston moved to Arrow Rock in 1819, ten years before it was incorporated as a town, and is counted among Arrow Rock's founding fathers. In 1833, he spent \$89 to buy all four lots of Block 17, and it was there that he built a four-room, two-story, Federal style structure. Although he envisioned it solely as his family's home, opportunity was at Huston's doorstep as tired, hungry travelers heading out to the untamed American West passed by his house.

Huston quickly expanded his home to make room for those travelers, and he added a mercantile and a second floor ballroom in 1840. During the midto late 1800s, the J. Huston Tavern served as hotel, restaurant and community gathering place. During some of the town's darkest days, it even served as a hospital.

Huston sold his interest in the Tavern in 1858. It was subsequently owned and operated by other families, including the Cobbs, the Scriptures, and Joseph Huston's daughter, Rachel McJilton.

Much of the town's prosperity depended on trade with the South, so the end of the Civil War marked a period of a decline for Arrow Rock and its Tavern. By the turn of the century, the Tavern's glory had faded and the old building seemed destined to disappear into the pages of history.



Revolutionary Women

Today we would call it heritage tourism, but in 1912, the Arrow Rock chapter of the National Old Trails Road Association just wanted to give people a reason to come to town. They set up a museum room in the J. Huston Tavern and filled it with historical artifacts. Those artifacts often had nothing at all to do with Arrow Rock, but they were interesting curiosities that appealed to families who were venturing out in their new automobiles.

The real renaissance of the J. Huston Tavern came in 1923, when the Arrow Rock chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution persuaded the Missouri legislature to purchase the Tavern for \$5,000, making it the first building purchased with public funds for the purpose of historic preservation. The legislature recognized a can-do spirit in the women of the DAR, and put them in charge of the restoration and the tavern's operation. The DAR's work at the Tavern so impressed the legislature that it purchased land around the Tavern to establish Missouri's first state park. The Tavern's restoration inspired others, too, and soon a preservation revolution was underway in Arrow Rock.

The women of the DAR operated the Tavern until 1984. After that, a string of concessionaires managed the business until the state took it over in 2013.



Partners & Friends

In 1959, during a statewide meeting of the DAR at the J. Huston Tavern, the members agreed to spin off a new organization that was entirely devoted to historic preservation and history education in Arrow Rock. By the time the luncheon meeting had concluded, the newly formed Friends of Arrow Rock had a long list of charter members.

"Our organization actually began inside that building," says Donna Huston, current president of Friends of Arrow Rock. "We're excited by the opportunity to keep the Tavern going and look forward to continuing a 185-year tradition of good, home-style food and warm hospitality."

FAR's new partnership with the state was made possible by recent legislation that allows Missouri State Parks properties to enter into mutually beneficial agreements with nonprofit "friends" groups. In the case of the Tavern, the state has agreed to continue maintaining the building and to cover utility expenses. They are also willing to share the expense of installing a back-up generator, which will save the day for the Tavern and its customers when the town experiences one of its all-too-frequent power outages. Friends of Arrow Rock will run the restaurant with very little oversight from the state, and will not pay the state any percentage of the proceeds.

In preparation for the board of trustees' vote, FAR's executive director prepared budgets, job descriptions and timelines to help the board through the decision-making process. Historic preservationist Marty Selby made a thorough conditions assessment of the Tavern, carefully studying the building from rooftop to crawlspace. The board made a well-informed decision at a special board meeting on September 29; the vote to take on the Tavern was unanimous.

Once the agreement was signed, FAR's executive committee went to work finding two individuals to fill key roles in the operation: the general manager and the kitchen manager. General Manager Karen Avery Miller and Kitchen Manager Janet Carmack both have strong ties to Arrow Rock along with the professional skills the organization was looking for. Karen and Janet are committed to following in the footsteps of Joseph Huston: offering delicious, home-style food with a heaping helping of hospitality.

Meet The Managers



Karen Avery Miller brings a combination of professional management experience and artistic flair to her role as general manager. She purchased her home in Arrow Rock in 2013, and made it her full-time residence in 2016. From the start, she immersed herself in her new community as an active volun-

teer. She is a member of the Experience Arrow Rock tourism committee, serves on the town's Board of Architectural Review, and is a former trustee for Friends of Arrow Rock. Karen is a talented artist and a nationally renowned expert on genealogical research. For Karen, leading the Tavern into this next chapter is more than just a job: it's a way for her to honor the Tavern's important past and protect its future.

Janet Carmack grew up in Arrow Rock. Her parents owned the country store and she recalls playing in the Tavern as a girl. Now her career brings her full circle as this talented cook returns to her roots to run the J. Huston Tavern kitchen. Janet, the former proprietor of the II Palms restaurant in Boonesboro, is familiar to mid-Missouri foodies who know her home-style cooking is worth the drive. She promises to keep the Tavern's famous fried chicken on the menu, but will be adding her pork tenderloin sandwich, which was named the "Best in Missouri" by the Missouri Pork Association.

Church Buildings Benefit From Buckner Gift

Halle Lujah! FAR has completed some much-needed projects on two FAR properties the — 1869 Brown's Chapel Freewill Baptist Church, and the 1872 Christian Church — thanks to a generous donation from the Buckner Foundation.

The gift allowed us to install a new roof and repaint the interior and pews at the Christian Church. That work, combined with recent electrical rewiring, sidewalk replacement, and exterior painting funded by other generous donors, makes the Christian Church even more attractive as rental space for weddings and special events. A substantial grant from the Sunderland Foundation (see sidebar), will enable us to install heating and air conditioning in the Christian Church, so it will be comfortable for congregants in every season.

Using Buckner funds, we fixed the foundation skirting and replaced the crumbling sidewalk

and steps at Brown's Chapel. This building, an important part of Arrow Rock's black history, is used frequently for meetings and workshops. These improvements enhance the beauty and safety of the building for all its many visitors.



FAR Receives Sunderland Grant

In early November, Friends of Arrow Rock received word that its grant request to the Sunderland Foundation for \$150,000 had been funded in full. This amazing gift will allow us to check off all the priorities on our property to-do list.

- Replace the aging wood shake roof on the Sites House.
- Install a new roof on the Arrow Rock Post Office building.
- Paint the exterior trim and metal roof on the Dr. John Sappington Medical Museum.
- Repair front wall structural issues at the Miller-Bradford House.
- Install heating and air conditioning at the Christian Church.
- Restore and repair the upstairs meeting room in the Masonic Lodge Hall.
